



PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Once again the official hockey season is over. (How about that for a ridiculously simplistic statement?) And once again the Uni club has faired reasonably well in most levels in the competition. As you can no doubt recall last year we finished second behind South Perth in the Judge and Byrne table with a score of about 69%. An excellent performance considering the size of our club. The lA team again finished 3rd in the Guth Ardagh table but unfortunately lost the first semi to Gordon Getley and a well known short corner hitter. Well that was last year.

Since the last time we saved the Palace with a high influx of diners we've been involved in the usual round of competitions and carnivals starting, as usual, with night hockey.



We managed to put four teams at the risk of scraped knees and elbows and our first team played in, but lost, the top grade final. We'll probably suffer the same contest again this year.

The summer hockey knock-out tournament had to do without the superb skills and finesse of a Uni team this year and this, sadly, may have resulted in a lack of tune in our state trial reps F. Blue Murray, L. Led Edmonds, S. Doc Hayward, D. Dino Reynold, G. dave eye Davies and J. Netts Nettleton. Hopefully the selectors will see the error in their ways next year.

Albany suffered from our enlightening presence yet again. We entered 3 teams but taking pity on the locals we withdrew one so that they might have a chance. Priorities off the field dictated that we should pull out of the top grade and hence we managed to only finish 2nd and 3rd in the grades we did contest. Although no Stanly Trimmers made the journey back the usual boring stories about the trip down and overcoming Many Mount Peaks City United and most of our players did.

Our first great money raising event, the Carnival, was cunningly used to try and put our grounds into their end of season condition at the beginning. However, a reduced number of teams that we could accompodate, 48 rather than 70 and astute alignment of the grounds by the Uni architect made the task a little difficult. A fine effort by all club members and especially the organising committee resulted in yet another successful carnival and fund raising event.

The season then commenced and despite vacations, I.V. and a non playing president we finished the first round with 3 teams contesting Challenge Cups. The 3A's best traditional rivals Y.M.C.A. 3-2 after being down 2-0 at one stage. The 4A's lost to Fremantle 2-0 and the 7A's (yawn) massacted old Wesley about 97-0.

Our I.V. contingent successfully rescued the Syme Cup from eastern state abuse and returned it to its rightful resting place in the corner at Charlie Browns. W.A. defeated N.S.W. 3-1 in the final after finishing 2nd in Pool 2.

Three W.A. players were selected in the I.V. combined team - Fearless Frank Fitzgerald as V.C. Ace Green and Rowdy Kazakoff. Three W.A. players were also named in the Australian Universities team to tour New Zealand. Ace, Rowdy and Slack Holmes all made the trip with Slack being named best touring player in a team that included 5 or so State players.

Congratulations to the I.V. team and our reps and special thanks to FF Fitzgerald for his inspired leadership of our team.

Approximately three teams of hockey players, a gaggle of golfers and a caddy made the journey to Bunbury. Their return brought only one pennant and the usual tales of disgusting and decadent performances.

If we didn't manage any State Senior representation we did supply 3 colts players - Steve Hayward as captain, Greg Davies and John Nettleton. By all accounts our guys played well dispite the occasional goalie's eye view of the game and woodduck umpires.

By the end of this season 5 teams managed to qualify for the finals. The 1A's finishing 3rd yet again, the 2A's second, the 3A's third, the 4A's third and, yawn, the 7A's first. Our other 4 teams finished well down the lists but we will be the only club to have had only "A" teams for each of the first four years of the new grading system.

Overall the club finished well down the list in the Judge and Byrne competition with an average of 50.65%. This was probably due to the loss of many experienced players from last year. Fortunately some new talent emerged to bolster the top four or five teams and with the large intake of new blood that can be rated as experienced we should have a firm foundation for the next few years.

In conclusion I would like to thank all those who have supported and helped to run the club this year and especially those parents and friends who lent their time and expertise to help out with the carnival and the grand final day. Special thanks are due to Blue Murray. Firstly, for yet another successful year as captain coach of the IA team and also for being president, lead organiser, initiator and venue supplier for many shows early this year.

Dave Miller has worked like a trojan keeping us in contact with the outside world and doing much of the tedious administrative work. Neil Bradley deserves commendation for paying all moieties on time and for being a thoroughly objectional money collector. Tim Ridgen has recently gone very silly and spends too much time working for the club so he also gets a mention along with the rest of the committee.

Next year a new, younger looking committee led by an older looking Dave Miller will be running the club and I trust you will afford them the same support we received this year.

The club has organized four shows during the season, those at Frank Fitzgerald Pino Monaco's, Kevin Fitzpatrick's and at the Hackett Refectory. The next Committee may give consideration to organising more than four next year.

Socially the most important event this year has been the move to the Chelsea Tavern. The club has been looking for a venue like this for a considerable time. The present position makes lastyear's arrangements which included Steve's, the Highway Hotel and various garages appear most unsatisfactory.

The presentation of the Wood-duck award and game reports have already formed part of the club's tradition which hopefully will be with us for some time to come.

Another tradition of the club which was remembered at Uncle Domenic's this year is Intervarsity. In the last two years we have had considerable difficulty filling sides. In Western Australia, I.V. is dying and unless we work very hard each year to send good sides we will cease to participate. I feel that if one year we missed out, we may never go again.

I would like also to mention the work done for the club by people other than committee members. I believe this year we owe much to the aid of Roger Grey, Frank FItzgerald and Fred Dessauvagie amongst others.

The Fun Day held on Sunday the 29th August was an outstanding event which was completely organised from outside the committee.

As is usual the club was much concerned with fund raising events. The carnival was, as is usual, exceedingly well organised. The drop in profits was due to factors beyond the club's control. The Quiz Night was also an outstanding fun raising event. It was so successful because so many members of the club took the trouble to organise tables. The club raffle however, which offers a prize of \$350 this year, can't be a successful one unless club members are willing to sell their raffle tickets.

A person who has put in a considerable amount of time for the club this year is Ron Hewitt, who has conducted most training sessions throughout the year. His help is most appreciated.

With an annual turnover of some \$11,000 a year, the Uni Hockey Club has quite a large budget compared with other clubs on campus. Our membership of over one hundred members meant that subscriptions income was nearly \$2,000. Fees were based on \$20, an increase of \$5 over last year. Grants from the Sports Council (i.e. money from Guild fees) came to nearly \$3,000.

Fund raising activities settled an income of \$943, with \$360 from the Quiz Night, and \$487 from the Carnival. These two events being our major fund-raising efforts.

The committee decided last year to invest \$1,000 in the Petth Building Societyfirstly to gain interest on our revenue, and also to provide an account for funding Intervarsities and other long term expenses.

By far the largest expense to the club is the affiliation fees made to the W.A.H.A., these totalled \$2,964. Intervarsity travel cost \$3,556, of which travel grants from the Guild were \$804 and the club subsidy was \$380. Our State representatives at the Australian Colts Carnival were also subsidized \$30 each.

I would like to thank very much Kevin Fitzpatrick for his efforts as Property Officer and Assistant Treasurer. He did most of the foot work on campus for me, and dealt with the Guild Accounts Office most ably.



Frank has been President of the Club for more times than any clubman for at least the past 15 years. Being President in the Uni Hockey Club is not an insignificant position as in many sporting clubs. In most years the success of the Hockey Club, as a playing and social institution, depends very greatly on the President to lead and direct the Club. Frank has been extremely efficient at attending to organisational details. He has been responsible for running the Pre-season carnivals on a number of occasions

Has served as Club delegate to Sport's Council, and is now a representative on a WAHA committee.

Frank has been a focus for Club social functions - firstly through the extension of his parents home for many arranged and unformal functions and more recently has extended his residence as a headquarters for many a club show.

Playing record

Frank has a very distinguished personal playing record. He has been a member of the top side since joining the club, and has played seven seasons of 1A hockey. Selected in the Colts side in 1971, State senior side in 1973, and State Rest sides in 1974 - 1976, Frank's ability is beyond question.

Intervarsity: 1968, 1969, Capt 1974 Syme Cup side.

Selected in the Australian Universities side in 1969 that played New Zealand Unis. Capt Aust Uni. team in 1974 vs N.Z. Unis.

Capt W.A. Uni. side vs Indian Unis side toured Aust in 1971.

For the past three seasons Frank has been Capt - coach of the 1A side. These have seen the best performances of University in the top competition since the mid 1950s. 1975 saw Uni playing in the Challenge Cup and the preliminary final. This year's side has an excellent chance in the finals.

In 1973, when we were relegated to A2s Frank played Al hockey for Old Mods. However he continued to hav a very close committment to the club.

General

Frank apart from his skill as a player and an administrator has brought an attitude to the club that was previously lacking. His enthusiasm for what ever he tackled has paid immense dividends and permeated through out the club. Frank has been an inspiration to his fellow team members as well as to a great majority of members.

THREE PREVIOUS GRAND-FINALS

Up until this year, Uni had won three Grand Finals since the second World War, all being during the nineteen-forties.

Only the other week, Mal, Ron and Eleanor blew the dust off the Archives of the "West Australian" and went searching for details of grand finals since 1945. In their searching they discovered details of the three grand finals we've won.

1945 - vs Cricketers - Uni won 2-1.

This gave Uni their first ever premiership, a memorable achievement indeed. A most notable feature of the game was the fact that then State player, Danny Dunn was Captain of the side and from all accounts was the inspiration behind the win. J.S. Lynn, whose name is perpetuated on one of our annual trophies, was also a member of that historic team.

1947 - vs Old Guildford - A draw.

This was quite a tussle it seems and the result was the only shared pennant in post war hockey.

In the first game after 30 minutes of extra time, the team were level on 2 all. They didn't have flicks in those days so the officials scheduled another match for the following weekend.

In the replay, at the end of 70 minutes the score was 2 all. After the first 10 minutes of extra time the score was 3 all. After the second period of 10 minutes the score was 4 all. Then the score remained constant at 4 all during the first spell of 5 minutes extra time, but after a further five minutes the other way, both sides scored again, and the result after 100 minutes of hockey was 5 all.

At this stage a third match was talked about but one of Uni's fullbacks was being married the following Saturday, and the other fullback had exams so the Uni team decided to quite while they were ahead and the result was called a tie! Danny Dunn was again a member of that side.

1949 vs Cricketers - won 4-3

There are few details of this match except that at half time Uni were down 3-0. After what must have been <u>some</u> pep talk at half time the team went back on the field and scored 4 goals to win 4-3. One known member of the team was Jeff Weaver, the father of Ian and Ross Weaver.

HAYWARD -AN OLYMPIAN?

Winner of the 1976 J.S. LYNN trophy.

This year has been an outstanding one for Steve Hayward and in the opinion of the committee has done most to bring credit to the club.

This year for the first time an award, the Olympians Medal, has been allocated to the best player in the 1A grade. Steve Hayward

became the first person to win that medal.

This culminated an outstanding season for him in 1A hockey. His ability has done much to get the top side into its first grand final for more than 20 years.

He has played every game at right full back and has held down this position magnificently. In addition to this he is becoming recognised as probably the best short corner hitter in the State. He was the leading goal scorer in lA's this year, scoring a total of 25 goals. He has scored a goal in every game that he has played this year.

Steve joined the club in 1974 when he was then 18. Prior to then he had played all his hockey in Geraldton.

Steve first represented the State when selected in the State Junior Side in 1970.

He was first selected in the State Colts in 1972 at the age of 16. He has been a member of the State Colts side every year since then. Being selected in five consecutive colts sides (under 21) is truly outstanding and in recent times is rarely achieved.

In 1974 Steve scored the winning goal in the Grand Final at the colts competition which was played at Perth.

In 1975 he was selected in the combined Australian colts side at the end of the carnival.

In 1976 he was selected as Captain of the W.A. Colts team and was again in the combined colts side.



The Grand Final was somewhat of an anti climax as we played far superior

hockey and won 3-1. The game really belonged to Brian Kazakoff whose performance was truly Brilliant. We scored a solo goal from the half line which struck the crowd with amazement.

Could it be that the game was originally played by 2.2m tall giants with straight sticks and when normal 1.8m tall people took up the game the rules committee, as usual, a very conservative bunch of traditionalists decreed that the length of sticks should remain the same and just maybe the one bright English Hockey player of the time determined that ifh e put a hook in his stick he would not have to waste time replacing divots after every attempted hit?



Mike Jansen, our solid left half who made sure he didn't lack pace with most effective sweep tackles on many right wingers.
